Short reminders of our history for this Centennial year

Throughout 2025, we'll be featuring very short stories about United Church history. Thanks to historian Gayle Simonson in Edmonton, we can also offer 100-word history vignettes for use in your own community! Here are vignettes 1-8. (Word format; when you click, the file will save automatically to your Downloads folder.) For our fifth vignette, she writes:

"Women have always played active, if undervalued roles in church activities. Methodist women were sometimes allowed to preach prior to union but were never ordained. In 1923, Saskatchewan resident Lydia Gruchy graduated with top honours from Saskatoon's Presbyterian Theological College (now St. Andrew's). She was initially refused ordination but finally, in 1936, became the first woman in the United Church to be ordained. Acceptance of women in ministry was slow but in the 1980s, my congregation had two women ministers. After attending a different congregation on holiday, our two young daughters looked up, wide-eyed, and commented, "We didn't know men could be ministers!""

★ February 27 gathering on unmarked burials: gratitude for all who participated

Many thanks to the 70 plus people from across Alberta and beyond who attended Our Sacred Obligations gathering on February 27, online and in person. We learned and talked together in circle, and were privileged to hear from Rev John Snow, a United Church minister who survived residential school; his brother Rev Tony Snow; elder Wilson Bearhead, and Sara Stratton, the national church's justice and reconciliation animator. We offer gratitude and respect to every First Nations and Métis person who brought their experiences and knowledge to the circle; over one third of the participants were Indigenous. Thank you to every non-Indigenous person made the choice to be in this listening and learning space. Special thanks to the planning team, the Edmonton Being Good Relations Cluster, Northern Spirit Regional Council, and the deeply hospitable community of Southminster Steinhauer United Church/ Spiritual Seekers United in Community. This gathering needed much support and commitment to make it into a good space, and we were blessed to have that support.

As always, we ran out of time for everything, and one follow up will be supports for engaging settler denialism of unmarked burials and the impacts of residential schools. Here is a PDF of Sara's presentation, which we hope will give a broad overview of the report on unmarked burials and missing children. Our work will continue together.

★ March Executive Update:

The Executive of NSRC met online and in person, Wednesday March 12th. The main theme of this meeting became "if we want to do something, let's do it big and bold!" We were inspired after hearing about NSRC Commissions and committees working hard to connect with communities of faith and ministers in different ways, reviewed as always our financial picture, the business that may need to come to the in person meeting in May 2025, as well as heard about themes arising for General Council 45's conversations.

We are excited to announce that we empowered the staff, along with Executive members, to develop a new staff position to focus on our ministry of serving those under 30 (called First Third Ministry). We are very grateful for the legacy funds from Alberta Northwest Conference and Presbyteries that will help in funding these new roles. More to come at our Annual Meeting in May 2025!

★ Israel breaks ceasefire agreement with immense civilian casualties; resources on Palestine for federal election

The United Network for Justice and Peace in Palestine and Israel (UNJPPI) speaks out against this terrible violence: "In the early hours of March 18 Israel attacked Gaza with planes, drones, helicopters and tank fire, killing over 400 unarmed civilians....this massive attack is unconscionable. We urge the Canadian government to condemn this

breaking of a negotiated ceasefire and the murder of the unprotected civilian population of Gaza. May God have mercy on the souls of the dead and ensure justice for those who kill, provide armaments or stay silent."

UNJPPI has also endorsed a five-point call for justice and peace in Palestine and Israel, focused on the anticipated federal election campaign. All five points and their accompanying education materials are in keeping with United Church policy and with actions our partners in Palestine and Israel have asked us to take.
